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Legacies of Giving: A Family Rooted in Service, Faith, and Catholic Education

In a world that often moves too fast to notice the quiet acts of kindness, the story of [the late] Mary Ellen Lamers and her family is a powerful reminder of the lasting impact of giving time and talent. Spanning three generations of Catholic school education, their legacy exemplifies what it truly means to serve.

It all began with Margaret Stern, mother of Mary Ellen Lamers. Margaret was a widowed woman of modest means who attended Catholic school in Brillion, Wisconsin. She saw the value of Catholic education and worked tirelessly to help Mary Ellen send her son, Chet, to St. Aloysius Catholic School in Kaukauna. Though she didn't have much, Margaret gave all she could, instilling a spirit of sacrifice and a love for faith-based education that became central to her family.

Years later, when Chet's children attended Notre Dame of De Pere (NDDP), Mary Ellen felt called to repay the blessings from her mother that had once been extended to her and Chet. She moved from Kaukauna to De Pere to be closer to her family, became VIRTUS certified, and immersed herself in the school's community.

Mary Ellen attended daily Mass with her grandchildren, comforted students during anxious moments, and created "worry



worms," small crocheted crafts to soothe little hands. After Mass one day, a student asked her for a hug, sparking a tradition as children began seeking her hugs on the way back from class. What started as a gesture for one student quickly grew, and she became affectionately known as "Grama Mary."

Teachers began noticing, too. "Grama Mary" visited classrooms as a guest reader, often with Chet, by her side. She quietly covered donated books for future classes and became a familiar face to students and teachers alike.

When Mary Ellen received the GRACE Outstanding Volunteer Award in 2024-25, it was a celebration of a life lived in service. Chet recalls the joy their family felt that day. After Mass, Chet had asked students to raise their hand if "Grama Mary" had read



to them, hugged them, or covered a book in their classroom. Countless hands filled the air, showing the undeniable impact of one person's time and talent.

Our GRACE community thrives when individuals answer the call to serve. We continue to be blessed by people like Mary Ellen in our schools and parishes. May her example inspire us all to give not just treasure, but our time and talent, because sometimes the greatest gift is simply being present in service.

Our efforts have included upgraded infrastructure, increased training for students and staff, and expanded partnerships with local law enforcement and experts.

These advancements reflect our unwavering commitment to creating a secure, nurturing environment where every child can learn and grow in faith.

However, ensuring the safety of our schools is not the work

of one person or group as it requires the vigilance and cooperation of our entire community. We ask all parents and guardians to partner with us by staying alert and speaking up if something seems concerning or if there is an opportunity to enhance security. As it relates to our own students, GRACE has a zero-tolerance policy for any weapons or threatening behavior.

Summer Facility Improvement Projects at GRACE Schools

Staff members and work crews all around GRACE spent the summer months improving their school's physical facilities! Thanks to the generosity of key donors, our GRACE Parishes, Site Advisory Council (SAC) fundraising, and GRACE funding several pressing needs have been resolved.

After fundraising for nearly 10 years, the St. John the Baptist Catholic School Boosters raised over \$100,000 to fund a complete gym floor renovation. The floor is safer and easier to maintain than the old wooden floor. Additionally, the Parish remodeled a classroom, with hopes of setting a precedent for facelifts to other classrooms next summer.



Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic School was blessed to receive generous donations that made several major renovations possible. All classroom windows, many of which no longer functioned, were replaced with full-expansion windows, providing greater natural light, improved functionality, enhanced security, and added curb appeal. In addition, the school benefited from a muchneeded electrical upgrade, which made possible the final gift: the installation of central air conditioning. These improvements now ensure a more comfortable, safe, and welcoming environment year-round for all who learn and work at the school.



At Holy Cross Catholic School, the kitchen was the fortunate recipient of an air conditioning system. With meals prepared daily in heat and tough weather, the A/C units are a welcomed improvement to their facility.





Students at the Resurrection campus of the Father Allouez Catholic School were greeted by brand new lockers as they entered the building. With the efforts of the SAC, and work of the Facilities Taskforce and Principal Dempsey, 150 old lockers were replaced with fresh, new green lockers.

Behind the Scenes: Summer Curriculum Work Prepares Us for a Strong Start

While students and families have enjoyed a well-deserved summer break, our curriculum and instructional teams were hard at work to ensure every child has access to high-quality instruction from day one of the school year.

Preparing for Into Math: Our New K-8 Math Curriculum

One of the biggest shifts happening this fall is the launch of *Into Math* by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt for all K–8 classrooms. Throughout the summer, teachers and administrators engaged in professional development and resource review to prepare for a successful rollout. Training sessions focused on understanding the structure of the program, using assessments, and planning for instruction at varied levels. Training will continue into 2025-26.

We're excited about what *Into Math* will bring to our classrooms: more student engagement, stronger mathematical understanding, and better alignment across grade levels. With continued support throughout the year, our goal is a smooth transition that benefits all learners.

If you'd like to learn more about math instruction at GRACE, explore our Standards-at-a-Glance documents. These provide a clear overview of the required standards at each grade level and illustrate how they build vertically from Kindergarten through Grade 8 to ensure cohesive, focused instruction. Standards-at-a-Glance are also available for ELA, Religion, Science, Social Studies, Technology, Spanish, and Classical Education models.

Review of Star Testing Guidelines for 2025-26

Another area of focus has been updating and reviewing our approach to student assessment. This is done on a yearly basis and helps us ensure that assessment practices are effective and consistent across our GRACE schools. Updates for administering and using the Star assessments have been developed to support more consistent data practices.

This includes:

- Key preparation steps to offer students the most effective environment for testing.
- Updated data collection to more closely monitor student progress throughout the year and adjust instruction to meet student needs.
- Greater alignment with Wisconsin's literacy requirements including at-home reading activities and progress monitoring assessments.

These updates will help ensure that assessment results are meaningful and actionable for teachers, students, and families.







K-3 Literacy Work Aligned to Act 20

In response to Wisconsin's new legislation for every school, Act 20 legislation, our K–3 literacy framework has also been reviewed and refined. In the spring of last year and over the summer, a team of educators and administrators worked to:

- Realign our assessment practices to better reflect the skills and knowledge.
- Streamline the tools used in K–3 classrooms to reduce redundancy and increase efficiency.
- Clarify how results should be used to guide instruction and inform families.

These updates will strengthen the way we assess student's developing reading skills and ensure we are responsive to student needs from the earliest grades.

Launching a K-8 Literacy Leadership Team

We are also excited to launch a new K–8 Literacy Leadership Team this fall. This cross-school, cross-grade group of teachers and instructional leaders will work together throughout the year to:

- Review our current literacy programs and explore new options.
- Identify strengths and areas for growth across grade levels in literacy.
- Research and plan for a pilot of a new core literacy program.

This collaborative team will be key in guiding our long-term vision for literacy instruction and ensuring alignment with best practices.

Looking Ahead

The work completed over the summer has established a strong foundation for the 2025-26 school year. With thoughtful planning, updated tools, and the dedication of our teachers and leaders, we are entering the new school year more prepared than ever to support student growth.
